For every child, we believe that the key to lifelong learning is through finding and developing interests, following motivations and individual talents through a varied and rich curriculum which allows children to explore their future. They will persevere when things do not come easy; taking a pride in every part of their learning journey with aspirations which will take them through the next stage of education and beyond.

What is SEND?

A child are classed as SEND if they have:

- A learning difficulty or disability which stops them from learning at the speed of others at the same age
- A learning difficulty of disability which means they need extra help to succeed in the classroom
- A disability that stops or impacts them from using the educational facilities.

Categories of SEND

The first step in supporting a child with SEND is to identify their biggest areas of need. These needs are:

- Cognition and learning- A child who thinks or processes information differently to other children.
- Social, emotional and mental health
- Communication and interaction
- Sensory and/or physical needs.

How to contact our SEND co-ordinator

Our school SEND Co-ordinator (SENDCO) is Miss Snowden. She can be contacted through the school office Tel:01274495190. She is available to meet with parents/carers at their convenience.

Starting school

During the summer term, before the children start school in Reception, parents/carers are invited to the New Parents Information Evening. At this meeting you will be able to talk about your child's needs with the reception class teacher &/or the SENCO. For children who may need more support transferring to our school this may start earlier with input from parents/carers, nurseries and the local authority.

If a child enters our school 'in year' information will be sought from their previous schools and their parents/carers.

Leaving school

For children moving to another primary school all SEND paperwork and information is shared with the new school wherever possible. For children moving to secondary school there is a strict transition process that is completed. Miss Snowden will meet with Year 5 parents in February of year 5 to discuss which schools when the considering. For children with more complex needs Miss Snowden will help support parents to visit schools. When the school has been allocated Miss Snowden will meet with the new teachers, the SENDCO & Head of Year 7 and all relevant information regarding an individual's needs will be passed on so that the appropriate support remains in place. Parents/carers work closely with the SENDCO & school staff throughout their child's time at our school.

Levels of support

For children with special educational needs there are varying levels of support. When teachers or parents/carers are concerned about a child's progress the teacher will complete an initial concern form and it will be discussed with parents. The child will then be observed by Miss Snowden and next steps will be put in place.

Provision Maps

All SEND children at Atlas will have a provision map. Provision Maps are produced termly to show the gets and support given for individual children. All provision maps are created by teachers with parents sharing their views. These targets are set and worked on by staff, the children and parents. These plans are reviewed each term to see what progress has been made.

My Support Plan

Some children may need a more in depth plan to show what outside agencies suggest and to look at the additional support we can put in place in school. These generally do not provide any extra funding.

Educational, Health Care Pan

Children with more complicated needs may need an Educational, Health Care Plan (EHCP). These are issued by the local authority after an application and a waiting period. These plans do provide some funding for schools which could mean extra support in class for a percentage of the week, support on the playground, small group interventions and support from outside agencies.
